COMMUNITY CENTERS

The Maria de la Esperanza Mission, located in the San Marcos Sierras region of Cordoba, Argentina, is a non-profit organization with a long history of charitable work in remote and vulnerable areas.

It includes seven Community Centers where the tireless Sister Theresa and a volunteer staff provide a daily meal to as many as 950 underprivileged local children.

David Denies supports the Foundation providing by food, electricity, gas, building supplies, and school materials to each community center. We also encourage our guests to contribute with donations that go toward building additional safe havens, where children are fed, receive after school classes, and take part in recreational activities.







SCHOOL SUPPORT

David Denies has been part of the school support program since the beginning, providing school supplies and other essential materials.

Community Centers deliver afterschool sessions designed to ensure success in the classroom. A teacher gives personalized instruction to the children and they accompany children through the entire learning process.

The main objective is to give each student new tools that will help them make the most of their education.

AWARDS FOR SCHOOL PERFORMANCE

In 2014, David Denies founded an award program for high-achieving children. Each child received: a pair of sneakers, books, folders, bags, pens, black pencils, crayons, erasers, sharpeners, and rulers.







HEALTH ON WHEELS

n 2002, a new initiative of Sister Theresa gave birth to a Mobile Clinic operated by a team of volunteer health professionals called "Doctors of La Esperanza". The mobile clinic was created to provide free monthly health-care services to uninsured people living in the most remote areas of northern Cordoba, and to educate them on disease prevention.

The team includes professionals from diverse fields: gynecologists, licensed pediatric nurses, internists, cardiologists, and dentists. The Mobile Clinic makes 10 medical missions per year throughout the region.

David Denies joined the project with an initial investment in technological equipment and with ongoing funding for travel expenses, including fuel, maintenance, and food for doctors and patients.

We've also donated a van equipped to transport the sick and elderly to and from the mobile unit, which stops at strategic points in each targeted village.







SOLIDARITY STAYS

avid Denies has designed an international volunteer program in order to support the Esperanza Foundation. Volunteers learn about the Foundation and its important programs, while participating in the day-to-day activities.

The experience includes a stay at one of our renowned hunting lodges, a stay in a hotel near the Foundation during volunteer time, and/or the possibility of staying at the Foundation's headquarters.

The program includes days spent working with children and staff in areas of social work, food preparation, education, health and recreation, and more.

In addition to acquiring new skills, Solidarity Stays participants leave with powerful and rewarding memories. This is an opportunity to travel, have fun and discover, but also to carry out a particular act of solidarity with an entire community.







PAYMENT IN SMILES

nce a month, a group of volunteers visits one of the Foundation's Community Centers. Activities range from construction and site maintenance, to horticultural work and health care planning. Working with children is always part of the routine. We do painting, dancing, and storytelling, as well as engage with children via sports and games. During this special day, volunteers also bring donations for children; things like clothes, sneakers, books, and toys.

There is a team of dentists in this volunteer group, who take advantage of these visits to run check-ups. And each child leaves the Solidarity Day with a new toothbrush and toothpaste.

Family members are also invited to consult doctors or share the day with us. Adults and children have lunch together and share snacks at the end of the day. Thanks to David Denies this program is possible, and all day long our volunteers are paid richly in smiles.
